IIJA Funded Projects

Arland D. Williams Jr. Memorial Bridge Rehabilitation:

This \$72 million award will rehabilitate the northbound I-395 bridge over the Potomac River, resulting in improved safety, reliability, and connectivity between Arlington, Virginia, and Washington, D.C.

East Capitol Street Corridor Construction:

This \$34 million award will construct the East Capitol Street Corridor with traffic calming measures, bike lanes, improved walking spaces, and upgraded bus stops, resulting in safer streets and better multimodal transportation options for residents.

Inland Flood Risk Management:

This \$6.2 million award will reduce inland flood risk in Washington, D.C., resulting in improved protection for residents and infrastructure against severe weather events.
