MICHIGAN INFRASTRUCTURE FACTS



IIJA Funded Projects

Michigan Lead Pipe Replacement:

This \$204 million award will accelerate the replacement of toxic lead pipes across Michigan, resulting in cleaner drinking water and progress toward the national goal of eliminating lead pipes. In addition, Detroit's \$75 million award will enable the city to replace all lead pipes within 10 years instead of the previously estimated 40 years.

I-375 Freeway Replacement:

This \$104 million award will replace the sunken I-375 Freeway in Detroit with a lower-speed boulevard featuring pedestrian walkways, resulting in improved safety, walkability, and community connectivity.

Soo Locks Project:

This \$693 million award will modernize and expand Michigan's Soo Locks, resulting in improved efficiency and reliability for ships and barges moving through the Great Lakes system and strengthening national supply chains critical for iron and steel.
