## IIJA Funded Projects

### General Sullivan Bridge:

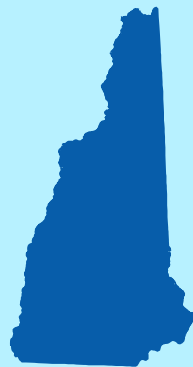
This \$20 million award will replace the General Sullivan Bridge with a new two-girder superstructure, resulting in the reopening of the multi-use path across Little Bay and restoring a vital connection between Newington and Dover.

### Manchester Transit Authority Low and No Emission Bus Award:

This \$20 million award will construct the first transit center in Manchester, replacing the city's outdated facility and enabling MTA to expand transit services—resulting in a key economic investment that supports the region's rapid growth.

### City of Berlin Capital Improvements:

This \$19.5 million award will install a snow-melt system and rehabilitate roads, sidewalks, and municipal parking—resulting in reduced maintenance costs and improved accessibility in Downtown Berlin during the winter.
